


Tip 1: Know your enemy!

Flies can be a major vector of disease on the farm, and they breed quickly.

An effective fly control campaign is essential.





Tip 2: Monitor your sheds



The first line of defence against flies is good shed management.

Being prepared in advance is crucial, because for every adult fly you see, there will be another six following close behind in the form of eggs, larvae or pupae.

Tip 3: Stem the spread

Generally speaking, minimising moisture is a good start to keeping flies at bay. Keep an eye on spills, broken eggs, or any sources of food to avoid attracting flies.


In poultry sheds, fly larvae sit in the top 10cm of the manure, so monitoring flies and maggots on a regular basis is highly recommended.

Tip 4: Rotate insecticides

To avoid the flies developing a resistance, don't over-use the same insecticide.

Rotate products regularly, ensuring the active chemical class is changing each time.





Tip 5: Lay physical traps

As a final line of defence, physical fly traps help to reduce the amount of airborne flies on farm.
